Introduction

Every house has a story and this guide is designed to help you discover it. The Guide has three parts:

- 1. Getting Started: How to determine if any research has already been done on your house.
- 2. Gathering Key Facts: Where to find answers to key questions regarding a house's history.
- 3. Telling the Story: How to fit your house and neighborhood into the cultural and developmental history of your city.

Researching the history of a house is just as difficult as researching the history of an ancestor, and the more you know, the more you will want to know. Be aware that this document is not intended to be an exhaustive guide to finding every possible fact about your house. Rather it guides you to key sources of information that can help you build a foundational understanding of your house's history. Dozens, if not hundreds, of other resources are out there, and as you dive into your search, likely you will be enticed to follow obscure or neglected paths to other pots of gold.

Like genealogy, much of the research on your house can now be done from the comfort of your home office or even your couch if you have a laptop. Where resources are available online, this document provides a link you can access from anywhere. Know that some resources are maintained at the city level, others at the county level and even some at the state and national level. If you need to pay a personal visit to a records storage location, this document provides the address and access instructions. The type and quality of resources available at the city level varies greatly from city to city, generally in proportion to its age and size; some may have significant resources, others have few.

If the task of researching your house seems daunting, you can always hire a professional House Historians to do all or part of the investigative work for you. An experienced House Historian likely has investigated dozens if not hundreds of houses in your area and is familiar with architects and developers who worked during various periods. Their experience often allows them to piece together what seem like disparate facts, or to employ a less common resource to answer a question that has you baffled. Check with your local historical and preservation societies and your city's historical preservation department for possible referrals.

Getting Started

Before diving into any research, check first to see if some has already been done. If an individual house or an entire neighborhood has an historic designation or is on a candidate list for historic designation, it is possible all or at least part of your house's story is already written. If your house is on a Historic Resources Inventory (HRI) for your city, there may be related DPR (Department of Parks and Recreation) forms documenting key historical and architectural information about your house. There are also HRIs at the national and state level, so be sure to check them as well.

It is also possible there are individuals working through what is typically a 15-20 year process to get a historic designation for your neighborhood. They may already have information on your house and/or would love for you to join the effort to get your house or neighborhood researched and recognized. Leadership of your local neighborhood association likely will know if anyone is working through the historic designation process for a neighborhood within its boundaries. They may also have other valuable insights or contacts which could help you.

Finally, don't neglect to visit your local library. They will have local history books and some, such as San Jose, Santa Clara and Los Gatos libraries have dedicated history rooms full of books and periodicals that often contain information about the history and architecture of houses in a particular neighborhood or of a particular architectural style or period. There is also a county-focused historical society, the Santa Clara County Historical and Genealogical Society (SCCHGS), which maintains an index to various books which mention historic properties. You can access the index at

https://scchgs.org/documents/onlineindexes-docs/historic-homes-index.pdf, and the references are explained at https://scchgs.org/documents/onlineindexes-docs/historic-homes-references.pdf. Once you open the first document use **Control-f** (**Command-f** on a MAC) to search by street name.

Resources for Getting Started

The key resources to consult as you begin your research are:

- 1. Historic Resource Inventories: Lists of houses and buildings already recognized as potential historic resources by your city, state or the U.S. National Park Service
- DPR: Official forms of the national Department of Parks and Recreation used almost universally to document the history and architecture of individual houses/buildings or neighborhoods.
- 3. Neighborhood Associations: Often the keepers of neighborhood histories and often aware of in-process work to document historic resources within its association boundaries.

The following matrix provides information on where to locate these three valuable resources at the national, state, and city levels. Each city in Santa Clara County is listed separately, so be sure you are using the information for the city where your house is located.

- 2. Description for each resource (presented alphabetically), including information on where the resource can be found.

If searching these most common resources is not fruitful, it may be time to call in a professional or contact your city's library or historical society (if one exists) for additional guidance.

¹ The appropriate date to assign is the month and year when the house's original construction was completed. While websites like Zillow and Redfin provide Build Dates in their descriptions, these are not always the actual year the house was completed but generally are close enough to provide guidance in narrowing the search scope.

² Not all houses were built from architect renderings. Frequently, the builder of a house was also the designer. Today's permit process requires detailed drawings of the planned house but not so in the earliest years of the county.

Resources Described

If help is needed in using or interpreting information contained in the named resources, employees at the site where the resource is housed can help with how-to guidance.

Architectural Style Books

Architectural Style books can help identify the architectural style of a house. The definitive guide is: McAlester, Virginia Savage. *A Field Guide to American Houses*. New York: Alfred A.Knopf, 2015. However, keep in mind that most of the homes in San Jose are vernacular buildings (local construction that does not adhere to formal, of "high" styles), so using local guides is also helpful.

The National Park Service has a good overview article entitled, "Bay Area Architecture" available online at Bay Area Architecture (U.S. National Park Service) (nps.gov)

The City of San José has developed a guide for preserving homes within the city entitled *Your Old House Guide for Preserving San Jose Homes*. The book's second chapter provides descriptions of architectural styles found in San Jose, and these guidelines can be applied throughout the county. Building Permits

Building permits can help determine:

- 1. When a house was built: Locate the permit for the original construction and use the date on its related inspection marked "final."
- 2. Who designed and built the house: The permit for the original construction will list the architect, if one was used, and the builder/contractor.
- 3. What changes were made and when: Review all permits issued subsequent to those for the original construction to determine the types and dates of alterations and additions. However, remember, not everyone applies for a permit even if it is required, so you may personally have identified changes, but won't find a permit.

Building permits are issued by individual cities and are available for public viewing either online or in person as noted in the resource matrix at the end of this section. If a permit is not located for your house, it may have been built prior to permits being required in your city, or its location may have been unincorporated when the house was built. The date of annexation is generally included in the property information provided for your address in your city's building permit records.

City Directories

City directories can help identify:

- 1. Previous residents—owners and tenants
- 2. What previous residents did for a living

City directories are the precursors to city phone books. Beginning in the early 1900s, in addition to an alphabetical list by surnames, the directories included a reverse directory by street and house number. Contact your local library to determine what city directories are available for research.

The California Room at the Martin Luther King Jr. Library in downtown San Jose has a few directories available online, and a large number of print volumes are available for use in the library. It also has within its collection a number of directories for other cities in the county. Review the extent of the collection at Directories, City of San Jose and Vicinity | San Jose Public Library (sjpl.org).

Calisphere University of California also has a number of San Jose City Directories available online. Go to City Directories — Calisphere.

The California State Library in Sacramento has city and county directories for every county in California. Most volumes are not online, but you can search the library's database to determine if they have the specific city directory you need. More information is available at <u>Directories</u> - California State Library.

Probably the easiest way to peruse city directories is to use an online subscription source like Ancestry. Visit their U.S. City Directory site at <u>U.S. City Directories</u>, <u>1822-1995</u> to determine what cities and years are included in their online collection. Check with your local library to see if they have a subscription to Ancestry that you can use at the library.

Several libraries in the county provide access to city directory images if you have a library card and some have subscriptions to Ancestry.com that you can use onsite. So check with your local library for city directory availability.

Contracts

Contracts can help identify:

- 1. Who designed and built the house—particularly for years not covered by building permits
- 2. Changes made to the house over the years—particularly for years not covered by building permits

Into the early 20th century, details of building contracts between the property owner and the builder of a house were frequently published in local newspapers or from 1911-1932, in the *Building and Industrial News (BIN)*, a local industry journal. These published contracts are an excellent source of owners, architects and builders information for houses constructed during periods not covered by building permits.

Internet Archive is the primary resource for searching the BIN online. The BIN was published weekly, and issues are bound in books covering six month periods: January through June and July through December. Use the following steps to search issues of the journal.

- 1. Go to www.archive.org to access the main page for *Internet Archive*.
- 2. In the search bar, type **Building and Industrial News**.

hovering your mouse over the individual covers.

- Select Search Metadata and press Go.

- 4. Select one of the journals to search its contents.
- 5. Select the search icon in the upper left corner, just under the Internet Archive heading INTERNET ARCHIVE and type in a key word for your search, such as a street name or subdivision name. Quotation marks ("") should be placed around a search comprised of multiple words, such as "The Alameda."

Textual results appear in a bar on the left side and blue tick marks appear on a timeline under the journal. Selecting a tick mark allows you to jump to the actual page in the publication that contains the article where the text was found.

Additionally, local newspapers should also be searched. See the "Local Newspapers" section for information about online newspapers.

Deeds and Patents

Deeds can help identify:

- 1. The subdivision/tract, if any, that the house is part of
- 2. Previous owners of the house

Patents will identify the first buyer of the land from the U.S. Government. It's a great resource for understanding property ownership for early pioneers.

To identify the ownership history for a house, begin with your personal deed and identify the seller (Grantor). Then search by the seller's name to find out when they were the Grantee (buyer) of the property and then locate the deed. Repeat this process until you work your way back to the original owner, likely the subdivision developer. For recent years, all this can be easily accomplished on the computers with digitized deeds and online search capabilities. However, for earlier deeds, such as in the 1800s, you will need to switch computers that access microfilmed indexes and deeds. Note that only deeds were microfilmed, so if your search of the Grantor/Grantee Indexes reveals other documents (e.g., lis pendens, mortgages, agreements), you will need to visit the Santa Clara County Archives to view the original document. Visiting the Archives will also be helpful when the microfilm of your deed is a very poor or incomplete copy. Note the book and page number where the document was recorded and email the information to the Archive at Archives@rec.sccgov.org when you contact them to schedule a visit.

Maps

Maps can help identify:

- 1. The subdivision/tract, if any, that the house is part of
- 2. Changes made to the house in prior years
- 3. What, if anything, was on the property prior to your house

County and City Maps

Your local library or historical museum/society likely has some historical maps for your city and/or the county. Maps are a great way to see the development of an area over time, beginning even as early as the Mexican Era. Many can be found online: simply search by Santa Clara County or the name of your city. Below are some of the more famous Santa Clara County maps, and links to a map of San Jos, and another link to a variety of maps related to the City of Santa Clara.

Parcel Maps

The Office of the Assessor, County of Santa Clara has parcel maps that show land as it is portioned for tax purposes. These maps contain the name of the subdivision(s), if any, of which the parcels are a part. Figure -1 which follows is an example of a Parcel Map; the subdivision name has been circled in red. You can find the parcel map for your house by searching your property address at the following URL. Then select the **Print Assessor's Parcel Map** link in the upper right to view the map.




Figure 1 - Office of County Assessor, Santa Clara County, CA, Parcel Map for Book 261, Page 5

San José Block Book

Block Books show the boundaries of all lots within the City of San José along with names of property owners. The California Room at the Martin Luther King Jr. Library has a 1909 version and a 1924 version with updates into the 1940s. History San Jose has San Jose Block Books circa 1925-1965. Sanborn Maps

Sanborn Maps were created for insurance purposes and are street maps that include footprints of the structures located on the included streets at a specific point in time. Subdivision Maps

Subdivision maps include the owner/developer and the date recorded, which would be the most appropriate date to use for when a subdivision was created. If the subdivision was created from rancho land, the map should also include that information. Unfortunately, the last upgrade to the search tool precluded the ability to search for subdivision maps by the subdivision name. So, a cross-reference matrix is needed to find the Santa Clara County Recorder's Office book and page numbers where the subdivision map was recorded. SCCHGS has both the cross-reference matrix and a how-to guide for finding subdivision maps using the Search Tool; links to both are below.

Newspapers

Newspapers can help identify:

- 1. When your house was built
- 2. Who designed and built the house
- 3. Changes made to the house in prior years
- 4. Who lived in the house previously
- 5. How previous residents earned their living

Newspapers are an invaluable source, because you never know when your house or its previous owners or residents will show up in the news. The best online resource for local newspapers is the *California Digital Newspaper Collection*, a project of the Center for Bibliographical Studies and Research at the University of California Riverside. Filters are presented in a banner on the left of the screen to help narrow results, and the order in which results are presented can be sorted in a variety of ways using the **Sort by** dropdown in the upper right of the screen. Notices of Completion

Notices of Completion can help identify:

- 1. When a house was built
- 2. Changes made to a house in prior years

Until the early 20th century, when construction on a home was finished, Notices of Completion were typically published in local newspapers or the *Building and Industrial News*, a local industry journal. These published notices are an excellent source for the build dates of houses constructed during

periods not covered by Building Permits. See the information provided under "Contracts" and "Local Newspapers" for details on how these sources can be searched online.

US Census

The US Census can help identify:

- 1. Who lived in the house previously—owners and tenants
- 2. How previous residents earned their living

The US Census is taken every ten years and includes information for California from 1850-1950. Access is available online for free at FamilySearch.org or for a subscription fee at Ancestry.com. Several libraries in the county provide access to free census images if you have a library card. Some also have subscriptions to Ancestry.com that you can use onsite. So check with your local library for census availability.

Telling the Story

Once you have the facts about your house, you may want to document its story. Many of the cities in Santa Clara County have prepared a Historic Context Statement which describes historic periods, themes, events, and people that contributed to its development as a City. This is a great place to begin an understanding of how your house and neighborhood fit into the cultural and developmental history of your City. Also, local museums and societies can usually help put your house into a historic context and provide material for use in telling its story. Consult the *Resources for Telling the Story* Table below, to determine if a Historic Context Statement, or historical museum or society exist for your city.
