Google Earth is a 360 degree 3-dimensional way to view your ancestor's world! In this class you will learn how to unlock mysteries in your research – from unidentified photographs to migration patterns. ## II. Getting Started with Google Earth

Download the free software by following these steps:

- 1. Go to <a href="http://earth.google.com/">http://earth.google.com/</a>. Click the blue Download Google Earth 6.0 button From the Install Google Earth with Google Updater page:
- 2. Unclick the Include Google Chrome box if you don't wish use install Google Chrome
- 3. Read the Terms and Conditions
- 4. If you agree to them, click the Agree and Download button
- 5. Follow the installation guide
- 6. When complete click the Run Google Earth button

#### III. How to Save A Location in the Places Panel

Using Placemarkers

- 1. Click he pushpin icon from the top menu bar
- 2. Name the placemarker in the pop up window

#### How To Save A Location in the Places Panel:

- 1. Click on My Places to select it
- 2. Right click on My Places and select ADD FOLDER
- 3. A New Folder window will pop up where you can name your folder and enter a detailed description of its contents. (You may want to have a folder for each surname you research)
- 4. Click OK
- 5. Scroll down the Places Panel and you will see your new folder under My Places

- 6. Click the location marked with the push pin and drag and drop it into the new folder
- 7. The box for the place is currently checked. Click it to uncheck and the location will be removed from the map. The box operates as a toggle switch for that location.
- 8. Scroll down further to the Temporary Places folder in the Places Panel
- 9. Locate the Historical Map overlay that was applied
- 10. Click, drag, and drop it into your folder. The overlay can be removed and applied again by clicking and unclicking its checkbox.
- 11. Select Save Place As from the menu
- 12. Name the place and save it to the desired location on your hard drive

## IV. Exploring Your Ancestors Lives with Map Overlays

- 1. Rumsey Historic Maps <a href="http://www.davidrumsey.com/">http://www.davidrumsey.com/</a>
  - Historic Maps are found in the "Layers" panel
  - Under "Gallery" select "Rumsey Historic Maps"
  - Click the Rumsey icon on the map
  - Click the map in the pop up box
